Origins of mhhe

Set up in 2003, mhhe was a partnership between five subject centres of the HEA, and has worked closely with the Mental Health Special Interest Group (MHSIG) - based within the subject centre for Health Sciences and Practice.

mhhe aims to increase networking and the sharing of approaches to learning and teaching about mental health across the disciplines in UK higher education.

Evolution of mhhe

- Phase one: HEA (2003-4)
 National network and jiscmail list; 3 national
- events; Learning from Experience; case study callPhase two: DoH (2004-6)
 - Regional networks (25+ workshops and events)
- Phase three: CETLs (2006-11)
 - Developers of User and Carer Involvement in Education (DUCIE); Ian Light Award; mhhe workshop scheme; living and learning conference

Changes to the HEA

- Four subject groupings: Health Sciences, Social Sciences, Arts and Humanities and STEM
- 28 Discipline and Subject leads (all based in York)

Academic Associates

- The HEA is building a community of Academic Associates to deliver and develop support for learning and teaching in higher education.
- Expressions of interest are sought from academics with current experience, who are leaders in their field, can work as part of a team, and who share the HEA's ambition to improve learning and teaching and the student learning experience.


